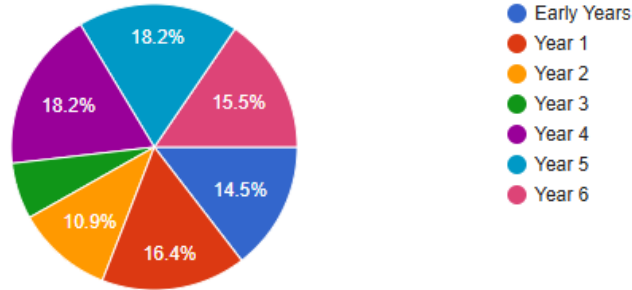


Which year group is your child currently in –

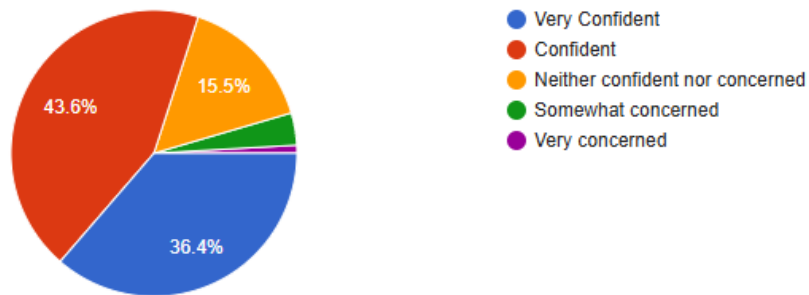


1. Overall confidence

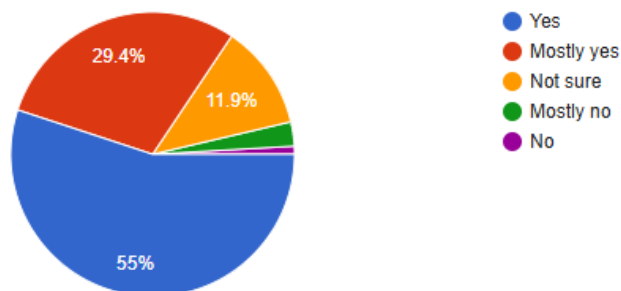


2. Age-appropriateness

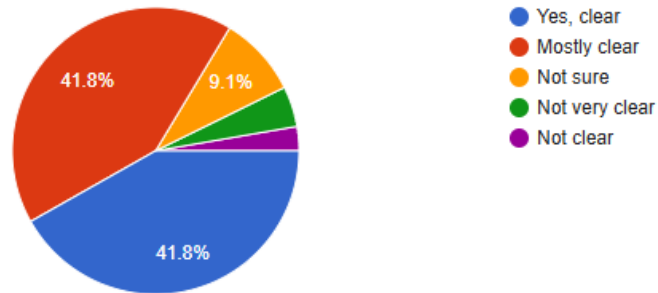


3. Clarity of information

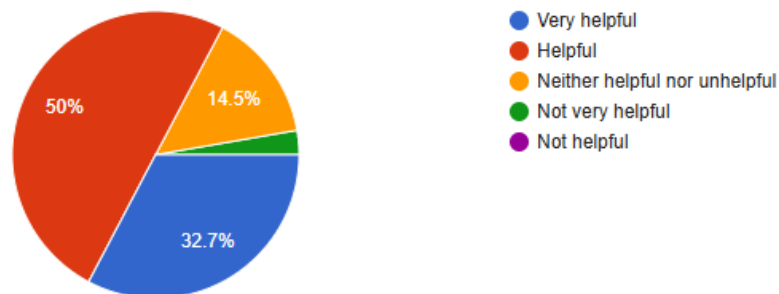


4. Usefulness of information provided

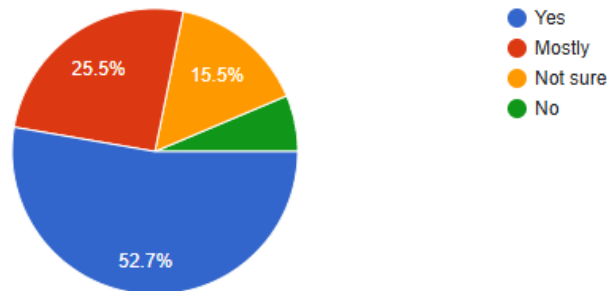


5. Access to information

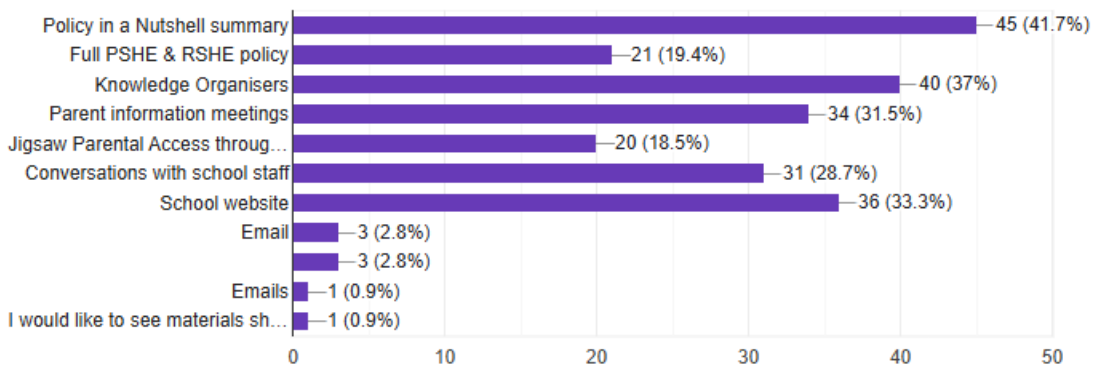


6. Ways of engaging with PSHE & RSE information

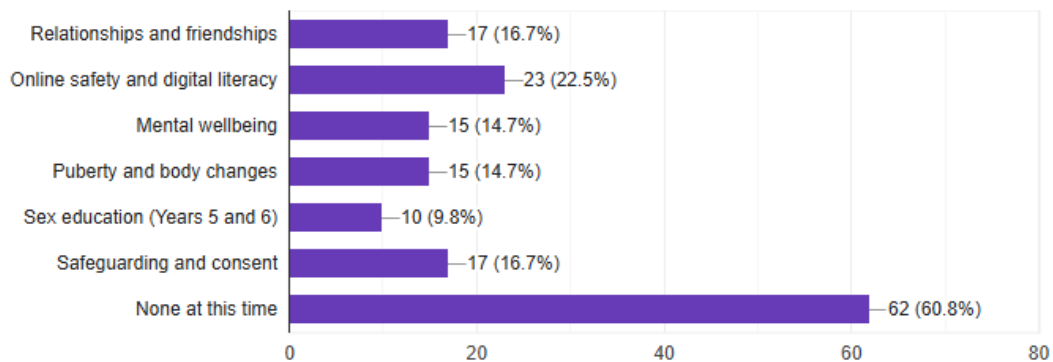

As you finalise the PSHE & RSE policy, I would like to formally request that Grief, Loss, and the Natural Cycle of Life be integrated into the curriculum earlier, specifically starting from EYFS and Year 1.

My recommendation is based on the following points:

Early Exposure: Children as young as five encounter bereavement. Introducing these concepts proactively helps demystify death and builds emotional literacy before a crisis occurs.

Trauma-Informed Support: Policy should recognize that grief in Key Stage 1 often manifests as physiological distress, such as PTSD symptoms, sleep disruption, and acute separation anxiety.

Resilience: Moving these topics earlier ensures that the school environment provides a consistent "safe space" for children navigating the emotional complexity of loss.

I believe including age-appropriate grief support in the early years and Year 1 provision will significantly strengthen the wellbeing of our youngest pupils. Many thanks.
